





The United States is home to more than **11 million babies**

Medicaid provides babies access to screenings, sick and well-child visits, dental care and vaccines that improve long-term health, educational, and economic outcomes.

► Babies who have access to Medicaid's powerful Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnostic and Treatment (EPSDT) benefit, which supports early identification of health and developmental concerns, have better health outcomes, including fewer chronic conditions.



ZERO TO THREE Early connections last a lifetime



Medicaid is a vital state/federal partnership with both contributing resources and states having flexibility in how they design and administer their programs. Proposals to reduce federal support for Medicaid, including through "per capita caps" or "block grants," will shift millions of dollars of costs to states. States will be forced to make decisions that could include:

Restricting criteria for Medicaid eligibility reducing the number of babies and toddlers receiving health care;

Decreasing benefits and access to services, as states may limit or eliminate coverage of certain treatments such as maternal depression screening;

Eliminating mandatory benefits including the Early and Period Screening, Diagnostic and Treatment (EPSDT) benefit, that provides comprehensive and preventative health care services for children;

Shift costs to families, who will be unable to afford care or be forced into medical debt.

ZERO TO THREE works to ensure all babies and toddlers benefit from the family and community connections critical to their well-being and development. Since 1977, the organization has advanced the proven power of nurturing relationships by transforming the science of early childhood into helpful resources, practical tools and responsive policies for millions of parents, professionals and policymakers.
